

#### **Crossbow Safety**

Crossbow Safety and Security – Safety comes first.

- When managed correctly, a crossbow tournament is one of the safest sports conducted.
- The sport is open to people from all age groups
- The sport is open to people with disabilities
- WCSA trains it's competitors and officials thoroughly to keep this high safety standard
- It is up to you, as officials, to ensure that <u>NOTHING</u> compromises the high safety standard that has been set.



- Ensure that the event has insurance cover.
- Check the field perimeter for possible points of entry.
- Ensure that there is, where appropriate, adequate backstop.
- A crossbow must be carried pointing downwards.
- A crossbow, loaded or unloaded, must never be pointed at any person or animal.
- Shooters may not walk around with a loaded bow.
- A spanned or loaded bow must not be left unattended.
- A bow may only be spanned adjacent to the competitor's shooting position.
- Shooters must take the correct stance.
- A spanned bow must be pointing down and in a line between the shooter and the target before a bolt is loaded.




- Shooters must not raise their bows to the shooting position if they are not in their correct shooting position. The bow must then point towards the target.
- Bows must not be elevated so as to sight above the target.
- EVERYONE must remain behind the shooting line until after the sounding three beeps or whistles.
- Shooting is only permitted between the single sound signal to shoot and the stop signal.
- When Bolts are pulled from the target it is essential that other shooters do not stand close in the line of the pull.
- Constantly check for intruders on the field.

- What should we do when we consider a specific technique to be a safety issue?




**Crossbow Safety** 

- What should we do when we consider a specific technique to be a safety issue?
  - Observe the shooter several times
  - Ask the opinion of other judges
  - Discuss the issue with the CoJ
  - Talk to the shooter's team captain
  - Keep on checking
  - The CoJ may ask the shooter (through the team manager) to stop shooting










